H1N1 Flu (Swine Flu) Update

(Update 3 - Released 2009 May 6)

Sonoma County Activity as Reported by Public Health

Number of Confirmed Cases:----- 1

Number of Probable Cases:----- 1

School Dismissals: No dismissals planned.

Public Gatherings: No restrictions at this time. *People who are sick should stay home.* Persons with underlying health conditions who are at high risk for complications of influenza may wish to consider avoiding large gatherings.

Return to work/school guidelines: Individuals with influenza-like illness (fever > 100° with a cough or sore throat) should stay home and not attend work or go into the community except to seek medical care for at least 7 days, even if symptoms resolve sooner.

Public Health Surge Center: The Surge Center is winding-down operations but maintaining an ongoing focus on disease control and surveillance and public information. Sonoma County Public Health continues to closely track the H1N1 situation in coordination with state and federal agencies.

National Activity as Reported by the CDC

The ongoing outbreak of novel influenza H1N1 continues to expand in the United States. CDC expects that more cases, more hospitalizations, and more deaths from this outbreak will occur over the coming days and weeks.

CDC continues to take aggressive action to respond to the expanding outbreak. CDC's response goals are to (1) reduce spread and illness severity and (2) provide information to help health care providers, public health officials, and the public address the challenges posed by this emergency.

CDC is issuing updated [interim guidance](#) daily in response to the rapidly evolving situation.

School Guidance. On May 5th CDC issued updated interim [guidance for schools and childcare](#) facilities on preventing the spread of novel influenza A (H1N1) virus. At this time, CDC recommends the primary means to reduce spread of influenza in schools focus on early identification of ill students and staff, staying home when sick, and good cough etiquette and frequent hand washing. Decisions about school closure should be at the discretion of local authorities based on local considerations.

Increased Testing. CDC has developed a PCR diagnostic test kit to detect this novel H1N1 virus and has now distributed test kits to all states in the U.S. and Puerto Rico. The test kits are being shipped internationally as well. This will allow states and other countries to test for this new virus. This increase in testing capacity is likely to result in an increase in the number of reported confirmed cases in this country, which should provide a more accurate picture of the burden of disease in the United States.

The CDC reports 642 lab-confirmed cases of the H1N1 flu in 41 states, including 67 lab-confirmed cases of H1N1 flu in California.
